FOR H1N1 VACCINE**

### **PLEASE SHARE WITH ALL ADMINISTRATIVE, CLINICAL AND BILLING STAFF**

This memo will address new billing information effective October 1, 2009 for the H1N1 vaccine and administration of the vaccine.

The H1N1 influenza vaccine will be distributed by the federal government to providers across the country, free of charge this year. The actual distribution date is undetermined at this time. However, it is anticipated to be available shortly after the first of October. The vaccine itself will be provided at no cost, but the providers (physician's offices and public health clinics) may bill for the cost of administration for Medicaid eligible individuals using CPT code 90470. This code is to be used in place of the previous HCPC code G 9142. Use CPT code 90470 for any form of administration, nasal, inhalant, or intramuscular injection. The administration fee for Medicaid eligible individuals is \$10.50.

The vaccine for H1N1, pandemic formulation has been assigned the CPT code 90663. The vaccine is not billable as it is being provided cost free by the federal government.

There are priority groups who should receive the vaccine first due to the potential for complications. The individuals with greater risk for complications are:

- Pregnant women
- Household contacts and caregivers for children younger than 6 months of age
- Health Care and Emergency Medical System personnel
- All individuals 6 months thru 24 years of age

- Ages 25-64 with health conditions associated with higher rates of medical complications, e.g. asthma, diabetes, autoimmune diseases and morbid obesity
- Those greater than 65 years of age are not at a greater risk of complications generally, but may have other factors for increased risk, e.g. diabetes, etc.

As with any other service, Medicaid is the payer of last resort. When applicable, Medicare or other third party payers must be billed first and the EOB from that payer is to be attached to a Medicaid claim form.

Medicaid payment can only be made to a Medicaid enrolled provider who has administered this vaccine. Medicaid does not cover mass immunizations held at community centers, stores and pharmacies.

H1N1 influenza vaccine may be administered by home health care providers during the course of an already scheduled visit.
