Resolutions for Dental Professionals

The following are resolutions that dental professionals can make for the New Year to improve themselves and the dental profession. Some of these apply more to dentist than dental hygienist or dental assistants, but everyone can learn from all of them:

- Become familiar with the scope of practice for your profession and/or the scope of practice of the employees under your supervision.
- Do not perform duties outside of your scope of practice and/or delegate duties to your employees that are not within their scope of practice.
- Do not practice without a current license/registration/certification/permit issued by the Nebraska Board of Dentistry and employers, do not allow any of your employees to practice without a current license/registration/certification/permit.
- Keep your and your employees credentials available in an office or place in which he or she practices and shall show such proof of credentialing upon request.
- Review the advertisements for your practice to be sure that the information is not misleading or in violation of 172 NAC 54 Regulations Governing Professional Advertising by Dentists.
- Communicate clearly and respectfully with all patients, staff and colleagues. If you are uncomfortable with communicating or do not seem to be communicating clearly, consider attending a course to improve your communication skills. **NOTE:** Some courses may **not** qualify as acceptable continuing education.
- Make sure all patients understand their options, the risks and benefits, the cost of each option, and give informed consent for treatment before treatment begins.
- Listen to patients and staff. Listen to their concerns and problems with an open mind.
- Never hesitate to assist dissatisfied patients. If necessary, refund the patient and refer them to another dentist.
- If the dentist determines that the dentist/patient relationship should be terminated, follow the proper guidelines.
- When in doubt, refer. Recognize that you may sometimes need to refer patients to someone better qualified to treat their problem and not try to perform procedures which you are not qualified to treat or not familiar with treating.
- Remember that it is better to prevent problems than to "cure" problems. Remember you cannot "fix" everything nor do everything yourself.
- Practice mainstream dentistry and not be the first or the last to use a new technique or material. Carefully research what you intend to do or use and do not rely solely on a manufacturer's or "guru's" claims.
- Do not over-treat patients! Be reasonable with treatment plans and fees. The patient's pocket is not a bottomless pit.

- First, do no harm! Take care of your patients and they will take care of you.
- The Board does not tolerate dishonesty. Read and understand before you sign any Board documents (including renewal applications) and do not alter records for your or the Board's benefit.
- Your personal life reflects into your practice and you cannot properly perform your dental duties if your personal life is a mess.
- Encourage any dental professional who is impaired due to the use of alcohol or other drugs to obtain assistance and treatment from the Licensee Assistance Program (LAP).
- Be aware of the Mandatory Reporting law (172 NAC 5). A copy is available on the Department's website at www.hhss.state.ne.us
- Be aware of patients seeking controlled substances and of your prescribing authority.
- Complete continuing education for professional development, not just for credit accumulation.
- Abide by the statutes and rules and regulations of the Board of Dentistry at all times. The Board has suggested that all dental professionals read the statutes and rules and regulations pertaining to your profession.

Please follow these resolutions throughout this year and every year to prevent problems, complaints and/or disciplinary action against you and your license.

Committee on Expanded Duties of Dental Hygienists and Dental Assistants

The Nebraska Dental Association (NDA) presented a proposal on expanded duties for Nebraska dental hygienists and dental assistants at the April 22, 2005 Board meeting. The concept of the proposal was given approval by the Board and a subcommittee was formed. The Board suggested that the NDA, the Nebraska Dental Hygienists Association (NDHA), and the Nebraska Dental Assistants Association (NDAA) work together with input from all interested parties to develop a final proposal to be presented to the Board. All interested parties have been working on a proposal that would include duties at different levels of training and would include an educational component for the different levels of training.



Meeting Highlights From 2005

January 14, 2005 – The Board discussed LB 89. This legislation initiated a locum tenens license for dentists. The Board also discussed LB 182, which requested a change in the scope of practice for dental hygiene. The Board continued discussion on the development of a national clinical examination. The Board reviewed and discussed the changes to the Uniform Licensing Law (ULL) rewrite documents, which include changes to the Dentistry Practice Act.

April 22, 2005 – The Board discussed implementation of LB 89. LB 382 also affected dentistry, by allowing certain prescriptions to be signed electronically. The Board nominated Roger Gerstner, DDS for AADE Citizen of the Year. The Board formed a committee to discuss expanded duties of dental assistants and dental hygienists.

July 15, 2005 – The Board discussed updates from the Enteral Conscious Sedation Committee, the Expanded Duties for Dental Assistants Committee, and the Alternatives for Expanding CE Acceptance Committee. The board discussed LB 306, which would require background checks on dentist applying for initial licensure. LB 306 requires background checks on anyone applying for initial licensure that has prescribing authority.

October 14, 2005 – The Board discussed that CRDTS chose to administer the ADEX examination for the 2006 examination season. The Board chose to not accept WREB and SRTA as of January 1, 2006. This would require a regulations change before we can deny the scores of these examinations.

Uniform Licensing Law Rewrite

The Uniform Licensing Law rewrite has been an ongoing project for the Department of Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure and all the professional boards for the last couple of years. The goal is to revise and condense the current statutes so that licensing requirements common to all professions are contained within one document. Requirements that are unique to each profession would then be addressed in that professions practice act. The Practice Act Committee of the Board of Dentistry has been active in 2005 and has made its recommendations to the Board of Dentistry and the Department for revisions to the Dental Practice Act. The proposed revisions will remove antiquated language from the Act, reorganize the text so that it will be easier to follow, and modify licensing requirements to facilitate movement of dental professionals into the state while assuring that their qualifications match those presently practicing dentistry in Nebraska. Department staff and Committee members worked diligently in an effort to have proposed legislation ready for introduction in the upcoming legislative session. In early January, however, we were inexplicably instructed by the governor's policy research office to not pursue introduction of the bill during the 2006 legislative session. The Board of Dentistry has respectfully requested an explanation from the governor concerning this directive. The Department has informed the Board that introduction is planned for the 2007 legislative session. The Practice Act Committee consists of Sam Jacoby, DDS, Chairman, and Jane Lott, RDH, and Jane Stratman, RDH.

Dentistry and Professionalism

At the heart of the responsibilities of the Nebraska Board of Dentistry is the promotion and furtherance of the "professionalism" of dentistry in the state of Nebraska. The idea of professionalism as an identity has gained greater currency and relevance in the healthcare world in recent times because of the growing importance of defining the relationship of health caregivers to the community at large. The implications of this concept touch the health care-givers with special gravity. Healthcare, once regarded as a work of mercy, concern and compassion, has come more and more to be portrayed as a product to be bargained for, whose value is determined by the market place. Healthcare professionals, once universally thought of as related to the sick and suffering through a *covenant* of fidelity, trust and care, are now too often characterized as *contractors* whose main goals are efficiency and cost containment. Patients are now all too often merely "customers" and caregivers, "providers." A once sacred relationship is in danger of becoming a profane one.

Defining professionalism takes special thought and care. For there is a tendency for all kinds of people involved in surviving in the market place to call their work a "profession" as a means of enhancing their image in a competitive world. Jos Welie, a Nebraska dental ethicist and leader in the dental ethics movement internationally, points out that we must look at the historical roots of the word. There we find that professionalism indicates persons with certain kinds of skills, education and hence, responsibilities, who make an *avowal* to others. The professional vows to serve the community

and frequently, to put their patients' interests before their own concerns. A person becomes a professional, especially as the term is understood in the world of healthcare, because only the community to which one makes this avowal has the power to grant this status.

Our society has yet to address adequately the social meaning of healthcare: is it strictly a commodity? How closely linked is healthcare to social responsibility? Healthcare's social meaning determines where we draw the line between what is public trust and what is private practice. It entails some sticky questions: are healthcare decisions strictly the business of the dentist and the patient? When should the Board, as keeper of the public trust, intervene, as in the case of substance abuse, conflict of interest or allowing services to be provided by non-licensed personnel? In what sense can communities make demands upon its professionals, and what demands would these be? And it entails some sensitive guidance giving: what should the standard be for dental error, especially when it is non-deliberate? How does the Board encourage dentists to act as professionals who own up to mistakes while at the same time encouraging the public to recognize the importance of allowing caregivers some leeway when they act with good intentions?

The question of professionalism in dentistry is of great importance to the dentists and the people of Nebraska. An interesting and important discussion of this issue can be found in the articles found at the websites below:

SUMMARY OF MANDATORY REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

A document developed to help licensed individuals understand the Mandatory Reporting Regulations

Every dentist and dental hygienist should be aware of the regulations which govern the **Mandatory Reporting** by health care professionals. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§71-168 through 168.02 became effective in 1994. 172 NAC 5 Regulations Governing Mandatory Reporting by Health Care Professionals, Facilities, Peer and Professional Organizations and Insurers became effective on May 8, 1995. The statutes and regulations offer greater protection to public from incompetent, unethical, or impaired practitioners.
