Child and Family Services Reviews

- Collaborative effort between federal and state governments
- Promote continuous quality improvement in child welfare systems nationally
- Evaluate state performance relative to federal requirements and state Child and Family Services Plan
- Identify both the strengths and areas needing improvement in state child welfare programs

Child and Family Services Reviews

- States that do not meet initial standards develop an action-oriented 2-year Program Improvement Plan
- The Children's Bureau works to assist states in enhancing their capacity to help children and families achieve positive outcomes through ongoing technical assistance support





CFSR Process

CFSRs assess child welfare outcomes and systemic functioning using:

- Statewide Assessment
- Case-level reviews
 - Case record and interviews
- Interviews with key state stakeholders and partners



CFSR Outcomes

- Two Safety Outcomes
- Two Permanency Outcomes
- Three Well-Being Outcomes





CFSR Outcomes

- Safety Outcome 1: Children are, first and foremost, protected from abuse and neglect.
- Safety Outcome 2: Children are safely maintained in their homes whenever possible and appropriate.
- Permanency Outcome 1: Children have permanency and stability in their living situations.
- Permanency Outcome 2: The continuity of family relationships and connections is preserved for children.



CFSR Outcomes

- Well-Being Outcome 1: Families have enhanced capacity to provide for their children's needs.
- Well-Being Outcome 2: Children receive appropriate services to meet their educational needs.
- Well-Being Outcome 3: Children receive adequate services to meet their physical health needs.

CFSR Systemic Factors

- Statewide Information System
- Case Review System
- Quality Assurance System
- Staff and Provider Training
- Service Array and Resource Development
- Agency Responsiveness to the Community
- Foster and Adoptive Parent Licensing, Recruitment, and Retention



Determining Substantial Conformity Seven Systemic Factors





CFSR Case Review

- 65 cases were reviewed using the federal Onsite Review Instrument (OSRI)
 - 25 in-home cases
 - 40 foster care cases
- Cases reviewed in four sites/teams




Preliminary Case Review Findings

- Outcome and Item Ratings
- Themes
 - Strengths
 - Areas Needing Improvement



Children are, first and foremost, protected from abuse and neglect.

78% Safety Outcome 1

OSRI Item 1: Timeliness of Initiating Investigations of Reports of Child Maltreatment

78% of 9 applicable cases rated as a Strength



Key Strengths

 Initiated and made face-to-face contact timely in most cases, particularly Priority 1



Areas for Improvement

- Agency did not meet timeframe for Priority
- Insufficient justification for exception



Children are safely maintained in their homes whenever possible and appropriate.

80% Safety Outcome 2

OSRI Item 2: Services to Family to Protect Child(ren) in the Home and Prevent Removal or Re-Entry Into Foster Care

- 100% of 5 cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 4 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 1 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Safety Outcome 2 cont.

OSRI Item 3: Risk Assessment and Safety Management

- 80% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 90% of 10 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 60% of 5 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Key Strengths

- Appropriate safety services were provided immediately
- Thorough assessment for risk and safety
- SDM tool
- Good use of safety plans



Areas for Improvement

- Loss of focus on safety due to child's mental health needs
- Lack of thorough assessment prior to discharge from care



Children have safety and stability in their living situations.

80% Permanency Outcome 1

OSRI Item 4: Stability of Foster Care Placement

100% of 10 cases rated as a Strength

OSRI Item 5: Permanency Goal for Child

90% of 10 cases rated as a Strength

OSRI Item 6: Achieving Reunification, Guardianship, Adoption, or Other Planned Permanent Living Arrangement

80% of 10 cases rated as a Strength



Key Strengths

- All children had 1 placement during PUR
- Timely establishment of goals
- Strong partnership between parents and foster parents
- Family Team Meetings



Areas for Improvement

- Court not supporting recommendations for concurrent plans
- Untimely change of goals



The continuity of family relationships and connections is preserved for children.

80% Permanency Outcome 2

OSRI Item 7: Placement With Siblings

100% of 6 cases rated as a Strength

OSRI Item 8: Visiting With Parents and Siblings in Foster Care

90% of 10 cases rated as a Strength



Permanency Outcome 2 Cont.

OSRI Item 9: Preserving Connections

100% of 10 cases rated as a Strength

OSRI Item 10: Relative Placement

80% of 10 cases rated as a Strength

OSRI Item 11: Relationship of Child in Care With Parents

78% of 9 cases rated as a Strength



Item 11

- 89% of the 9 applicable cases concerted efforts were made to promote and support the relationship with the mother
- 80% of the 5 applicable cases concerted efforts were made to promote and support the relationship with the **father**



Key Strengths

- Lengthy visits of good quality
- Siblings placed together
- Quality parent/child visits
- Good use of relative and fictive kin placements



Areas for Improvement

- Lack of effort to locate paternal relatives
- Overcoming barriers to engage parents in relationship building activities



Well-Being Outcome 1

Families have enhanced capacity to provide for their children's needs.

53% Well-Being Outcome 1

OSRI Item 12: Needs and Services of Child, Parents, and Foster Parents

- 67% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 70% of 7 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 60% of 3 applicable In-home Cases rated as a Strength

OSRI Item 12A: Needs Assessment and Services to Children

- 87% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 90% of 9 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 80% of 4 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Item 12

OSRI Item 12B: Needs Assessment and Services to Parents

- 67% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 70% of 7 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 60% of 3 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Item 12B

- In 86% of 14 applicable cases concerted efforts were made to assess and address the needs of mothers
- In 69% of 13 applicable cases concerted efforts both to assess and address the needs of fathers

OSRI Item 12C: Needs Assessment and Services to Foster Parents

 90% of 9 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength



Well-Being Outcome 1 cont.

OSRI Item 13: Child and Family Involvement in Case Planning

- 80% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 70% of 7 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 5 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Item 13

- In 100% of 8 applicable cases children were involved in case planning
- In 93% of 14 applicable cases mothers were involved in case planning
- In 77% of 13 applicable cases fathers were involved in case planning



Well-Being Outcome 1 Cont.

OSRI Item 14: Caseworker Visits With Child

- 93% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 10 applicable foster care cases rated as a Strength
 - 80% of 4 applicable in-home cases rated as a Strength



Well-Being Outcome 1 Cont.

OSRI Item 15: Caseworker Visits With Parents

- 73% of 15 cases rated as a Strength
 - 70% of 7 applicable foster care cases rated as a Strength
 - 80% of 4 applicable in-home cases rated as a Strength



Item 15

- 86% of 14 applicable cases both the frequency and quality of visits with mother were sufficient
- 77% of 13 applicable cases both the frequency and quality of visits with father were sufficient



Key Strengths

- Comprehensive assessments for child, parents and foster parents
- Strong use of Family Support Workers
- Crisis Navigator for Family Team Meetings
- Quality caseworker visits
- Full involvement in individualized case planning



Areas for Improvement

- Challenges involving incarcerated parents
- Services assessed but no provision
- Lack of engagement with fathers



Children receive appropriate services to meet their educational needs.

100% Well-Being Outcome 2

OSRI Item 16: Educational Needs of the Child

- 100% of 10 cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 7 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 3 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Key Strengths

- Assessments conducted and followed up with services identified
- Informative reports provided by family support worker



Areas for Improvement

N/A



Children receive adequate services to meet their physical and mental health needs.

86% Well-Being Outcome 3

OSRI Item 17: Physical Health of the Child

- 83% of 12 cases rated as a Strength
 - 90% of 9 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 50% of 2 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Well-Being Outcome 3 cont.

OSRI Item 18: Mental/Behavioral Health of the Child

- 90% of 10 cases rated as a Strength
 - 100% of 6 applicable Foster Care cases rated as a Strength
 - 75% of 4 applicable In-home cases rated as a Strength



Key Strengths

- Medical issues quickly addressed
- No issues with seeking dental treatment
- No wait-lists for mental health treatment
- Sufficient medication monitoring



Areas for Improvement

Some lack of follow up with medical care



Next Steps



Next Steps: Program Improvement Plan (PIP)

- Final Report is issued to the State
- PIP due to Children's Bureau within 90 days of receiving Final Report and determination of nonconformity
- Continued collaborative effort between the State and Children's Bureau to develop and monitor Nebraska's PIP
- Continued collaboration with partners and families in development of PIP



Stages of PIP development

- 1. Analyze data
- 2. Explore possible interventions
- 3. Finalize interventions
- 4. Map out implementation plan for interventions
- Measurement Plan
- 6. Reporting Structure



Program Improvement Plan

- Implement plan over 2 years with additional year to monitor data measures
- Safety interventions must be prioritized and addressed in less than 2 years
- State must include & complete key activities to benchmark progress (most significant action steps)
- State must include and achieve measurable progress on certain items
